## INSTRUCTION

In the previous Lessons you walked through the process of configuring your free **WordPress** accounts to establish a basic web site functioning as a blog. In this Lesson you must apply what you learned previously as this Lesson will only refer to those tasks. Refer back to previous Lessons should you need to review.

### WordPress – Acquiring a Commercial Web Host

For the rest of our lessons you need to now acquire a commercially hosted web site by creating an account with a web hosting company. We will focus on using a web hosting company that offers what is referred to as a *single click WordPress installation*. For most individuals and small-to-medium size businesses this is the preferred method.

#### **Something to Think About**

The other method, manually installing the **WordPress** software on an appropriate server, is well beyond the scope and prerequisites of this class. For example, [open.nasa.gov](http://open.nasa.gov) was created using this method. You can take a look at WordPress.org for more information regarding manually installing WordPress: [Download WordPress](#).

If you are interested in pursuing this further it is recommended that you take a course in Linux systems administration.

You will need to identify an appropriate web hosting company (also known as an internet service provider). WordPress currently recommends three web hosting companies:

While there are many - probably hundreds - of companies that offer web hosting, for the purposes of this class we will focus solely on one of the three web hosts recommended by **WordPress hosting**. And for the purposes of this class all discussion will focus on one of the three web hosting companies recommended by **WordPress: Bluehost.com**

You are welcome to select any appropriate web hosting company but please realize you will need to adapt some of these tutorials to a different environment. And before you select your own host you need to carefully examine what they provide and the terms and conditions of their web hosting. Include some of these thoughts in your decision process:

- Are they optimized for WordPress?
- Do they offer a single click installation process?
- What is the monthly cost?
- Can you cancel your account at any time?
- Do they provide free technical support?
- What does an internet search for reviews and comments for this specific company show?

All of the tutorials and references in this and the following lessons will relate specifically to **Bluehost**. If you select a different web host you will need to follow their instructions for setting up your account.

### **Naming Your Website**

When you sign up for an account with your web hosting company you are going to create a unique domain name for your website.

This unique name is also called a **URL** (uniform resource locator).

You are familiar with using these, for example if you wanted to use the Google® search engine you would enter the following domain name in your browser: **www.google.com**

The complete URL long form of this name is: <http://www.google.com>

So, you need to decide what name your website should have. Realize that with millions of domain names in existence it is very likely the specific domain name you would prefer has already been taken. You are probably the most familiar with the domain ".com" which is the preferred business domain. But there are others such as ".net" and ".biz".

So how do you create a name? Answer some questions:

- What is your website about (cars, shoes, horses, golf, books, etc.)?
- Are there names (key words) that might further distinguish your website (collectible, running, miniature, clubs, antique, etc.)?
- Is there a specific name you would like to include (your name, your business name, a state or country name)?

### Assignment 7a: Creating a name for your website

Your first assignment is to decide on a domain name.

Then make a list of 9 variations of that name.

Hopefully one of the ten names will be available. It is possible you may have to revisit this process at the time you sign up for your web site. But you need to be as prepared as possible BEFORE you start the process.

You may really want "ilovereallyoldbooks.com" but it is very possible that name is taken. However, you may find that "ilovereallyoldbooks.net" or "ilovereallyoldbooks1436.com" available.

When you sign up for your web site your web hosting company will let you know if a desired name is available.

### Assignment 7b: Preparing to create your account with a web hosting company

In order to complete this exercise you must either already have access to a commercial or commercial-grade web host account or you must rent an account. If you already have access to an appropriate web host account you can skip the sign-up process and go directly to installing **WordPress**.

Please note: most commercial web host companies require that you provide payment either through a credit card, PayPal®, or in some cases by check. If you have any questions you need to contact the web host company and determine your options.

It is recommended that for class purposes you sign up for a "monthly" account rental that can be discontinued at the end of this class or at some later time of your choosing.

Again, for demonstration purposes, Bluehost.com will be used to represent the commercial web hosting company.
